Reflections from the Administrator's Desk

.Growing up as July ended, and although there was still the month of August to unfold, I always felt that the summer holidays were practically over, as August would fly by and September would be upon us in no time. How quickly time rushes along is perhaps more the experience of those who are busy and have many things to accomplish in a short time, so that the feeling is often "there's just not enough time to get everything done that I would like". Yes, admittedly the fault lies with my poor planning or utilization of time that was available earlier to anticipate and complete other tasks ahead of time, so that they don't all come due at the end of the week or month as often it seems to happen. But the fact remains that as mortal beings, time is always finite and limited by its nature, as is our natural and earthly lives. With each passing hour and day, our earthly lives are that much shorter than before. Every reminder of our mortality and human limitations can be a good thing in terms of helping us appreciate how precious is the gift of time that God has allotted us to do His will and to work for His kingdom. All too often, we assume that we shall more time in the future when we are not so busy to get serious about our Catholic faith, to read the Bible, to pray more intensely and to attend Mass during the week. I suspect that whatever patterns and habits we form earlier in life will accompany into our latter years, so that, even if we cannot always find the time on a given day because of the demands of family life, work and other responsibilities, we should strive to build the structure of each day time for God + nurturing our prayer relationship with Him, attending Sunday Mass regularly. If we can strive to establish a wholesome spirituality rooted in the practice of our Catholic faith and the service of our neighbor earlier in life, there is a greater likelihood that it will be something we can add to later in life as our situation changes and the years go by. Sometimes our brushes with illness or the death of someone we know can be the impetus for thinking more seriously about life's mortality and finite character. Whatever it might be, it is always for us to appreciate that our lives are a gift from God and that we are ultimately accountable for how we spend whatever time God has allotted us in how we serve Him both in acts of worship and contemplation and the service of our neighbor in the expression of the Christian virtues and the pattern of holiness that His grace produces in us. My God, have mercy on me!

FAITH MATTERS:

July ends by celebrating the Memorial of St. Ignatius of Loyola, the founder of the Jesuits, and August begins with the Memorial of St. Alphonsus Liguori, the founder of the Redemptorists. St. Alphonsus (1696 – 1787) would establish the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer with a special focus on preaching parish missions to counteract the rigid legalism and extreme views on predestination of the heretical Jansenist movement. A very capable and pastoral preacher who aimed to make his sermons easily grasped and understood by the most ordinary people, St. Alphonsus wrote extensively on Moral Theology as well on matters of spirituality. **The Glories of Mary, Visits to the Blessed Sacrament,** and his **Stations of the Cross** are still being read and utilized to this day. St. Ignatius of Loyola, pray for us. St. Alphonsus Liguori, pray for us.
