MUSINGS & NOTES FROM THE ADMINISTRATOR'S DESK

In today's gospel, when Jesus is asked, "Lord, will only a few people be saved?" He doesn't even venture an answer but rather aims the attention to what it takes to be saved, as He answers: "Strive to enter through the narrow gate, for many, I tell you, will attempt to enter but will not be strong enough. After the master of the house has arisen and locked the door, then will you stand outside knocking and saying, 'Lord, open the door for us.' He will say to you in reply, 'I do not know where you are from.' And you will say, 'We ate and drank in your company and you taught in our streets.' Then he will say to you, 'I do not know where you are from. Depart from me, all you evildoers!' These words fly in the face of the common assumption, even among Mass-attending Catholics, especially those who seldom or never go confession, and I daresay, even those who seldom or never attend Sunday Mass, as everyone just waltzes into heaven, no questions asked and even no time in purgatory required. How far this seems to be from the Act of Contrition, wherein the penitent prayed: "...I detest all my sins because I dread the loss of heaven and the pains of hell (*or* Your just punishment), but most of all because they have offended You, My God..." Within this faulty belief system, there is a great deal of presumption when it comes to God and where we will be spending our eternity and a practical denial of the salvific redemption of Christ's passion, death and resurrection, and a negation of the sacraments and any sanctification through the Holy Spirit. Within this minimalistic approach to salvation or spending eternity in a nebulous self-centered heaven, just being a good person, more or less, is sufficient. The voice of one's inner conscience has been silenced or largely ignored and there is little call for accountability, as everyone will be judged favorably because "God loves us." I was recently struck by the profound depth of St. Paul's statement in Philippians 3:20-21a: "For us, our homeland is in heaven, and from heaven comes the Savior we are waiting for, the Lord Jesus Christ, and He will transfigure these wretched bodies of ours into copies of His glorified body." Since God is all perfect and holy, we must purified and cleansed of all sins and blemishes that cling to us before we enter into His heavenly presence and company. A very good antidote and remedy for dealing with this kind of heresy and false assumption about God would be to delve into the lives of the saints and martyrs, especially those accounts that tell as it is and are not sugar-coated & *To be continued on the next page under FAITH MATTERS*
