MUSINGS & NOTES FROM THE ADMINISTRATOR'S DESK

In various ways and different contexts, I kept coming back to some reflections percolating within my heart about the redemptive value & merit of human suffering, much of it inspired in St. Paul's letters. In Colossians 1:24: "It makes me happy to suffer for you, as I am suffering now, and in my own body to do what I can to make up all that has still to be undergone by Christ for the sake of His body, the Church." In no way is St. Paul implying that Christ's suffering was incomplete or lacking in its effecting our salvation and redemption, but more in the sense that we join our particular suffering to Christ's as He would us to take our cross daily and to follow Him, if we aspire to become His disciples. Having spoken of having the mind and heart of Christ, who emptied Himself completely even to the point of dying on the cross, in Philippians 3:10: "All I want is to know Christ +the power of His resurrection and to share His sufferings by reproducing the patten of His death." Or again in 2 Corinthians 4:10: "...always, wherever we may be, we carry with us in our body the death of Jesus, so that the life of Jesus, too, may always be seen in our body." For Catholics, human suffering is part of every human experience whether this be physical, emotional, psychological, or spiritual but it need not be in vain or endured alone, as we can offer it up to Christ for whatever merits it might have in His sight to benefit ourselves or someone else. We have the stories of the martyrs & saints who offered their lives for the conversion and salvation of sinners. St. Padre Pio would exhort to let no occasion of our human sufferings and difficulties not to have some meritorious effect for our Christian lives. Some sufferings can be very hard to endure, but by imploring the saints, especially the Blessed Virgin Mary, we can be inspired to find encouragement in this noble practice and piety. Our difficulties and hardships borne in Christ deepens our own appreciation for what Christ willingly embraced for our salvation on the cross and it gives added inspiration as we join the prayer of Christ our High Priest at the altar for the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. Even our personal prayers and devotions can be infused with this practical reminder to continually offer up all the little and larger trials and tribulations of life, the disappointments and setbacks we experience, so that we take a more selfless surrender to God's will that helps us to grow in humility, charity, and generosity of heart and spirit.

Allow me here to share this small reflection from the feast of St. Martha, Mary and Lazarus this past Friday taken the Magnificat Mass Journal, entitled 'Offering Our Burdens to Jesus'. "In our daily duties there are always burdensome elements which entail some measure of fatigue and discomfort. But these are the very things that we should appreciate as precious gifts that we can offer to God. Everything that tastes of suffering is, in fact, of utmost importance. The world does not accept suffering, because it is no longer familiar with the value Christian life gives it, and because suffering goes against our human nature. Thus, the world tries to avoid and to ignore it. Yet suffering has a mysterious task: It can become a way to happiness, to that true and enduring happiness which alone can fill our hearts. It is the same happiness that God enjoys and that we humans, destined to what is absolute, can share already in this life. Precisely through his suffering, Jesus has given joy to every person: joy here on earth and unending joy in the next life. In the same way, by accepting and offering to him our daily worries and concerns, we obtain happiness for ourselves and for others."
