## Cross Canada Marian Tour

Canada was Consecrated to the Immaculate Heart of Mary in Ottawa in 1947. This year, we celebrate the 75th Anniversary of this event. The Marian Statue that was used at the time was from Canada's National Marian Shrine located at Cap de la Madeleine near Trois Rivières, Quebec. The original statue is known as Our Lady of the Cape. As a result, the Marian Devotional Movement is spearheading pilgrim statue tours of Our Lady of the Cape to provide opportunities for Canadians to venerate Canada's National Madonna, to promote consecration to the Immaculate Heart of Mary and to promote enrollment in the Confraternity of the Most Holy Rosary. ## INTERPRETING THE BIBLE IN THE EARLY CHURCH: First 4 centuries - with Fr. Scott Lewis, SJ

May 2, 9, 16, 24, & 30 via Zoom  
11 am Regina time

US\$75 This course will examine the interpretation of Scripture in the early Church from the formation of the New Testament through the 4th century CE. We begin by focusing on the various ways in which the Scriptures were interpreted in the Jewish tradition in the three centuries BCE and the continuation of these traditions in the composition and of the New Testament. We will cover the allegorical approach, visual displays of biblical stories and themes, the influence of the Christological debates in the 4th century, the bible and the Desert Fathers, and the ways in which challenges to early Christianity affected the interpretation of Scripture. The two main schools of interpretation – Alexandria and Antioch – will be studied, along with some of the influential interpreters in these schools. Special attention will be given to anti-Judaic and supersessionist elements in the composition and interpretation of Scripture. TO REGISTER CONTACT: registrar@biblical-program.com

## Decolonizing Ourselves: Exploring the Spirit of Land Acknowledgements

May 3 and May 5, 2022

8pm Central Daylight, 9pm Eastern Daylight

We welcome you to attend two online workshops with Dr Rose Roberts (PhD) and Dr Stryker Calvez (PhD), two Cree and Métis experts who have presented land acknowledgement workshops at the University of Saskatchewan for many years and created a series of short videos to help others develop and personalize their land acknowledgements to make them meaningful. This online series will invite us to reflect and act on the role and meaning of land acknowledgements in our personal lives as well as in our faith communities. We hope to connect with one another to consider our relationships with place, land, people and spirit, and to learn how to make our land acknowledgements authentic and genuine.

The workshops will each be 1.5 hours. They will require your active participation as well as a personal commitment (2-3 hours) to learning and self-reflection prior to the first event. This is mandatory 'homework' that involves:
