Reflections from the Administrator's Desk

Since much of much of our Sunday and weekday gospels are focusing upon the “end times” & the second Coming of Christ, these words found in this past Saturday’s “Meditation” in the Magnificat Mass Journal are worth pondering and praying over.

“We should journey through the world with this attitude toward life: Every day brings us closer to our death where *life* begins. If we encounter illnesses on the way, we should see them as steps prepared by the love of God to help us scale the heights, as trials to prepare us for *the trial*. We are like small hosts that are not yet completely consumed, awaiting the moment of the *consummatum est* (“it is accomplished”), which will come for all of us. Thus we are mortals with the mortal God man so as to rise with him to a life that will never end.

Lord, in suffering, in the “Mass” for which we prepare, may our living of your will be our precious gift to you, which we offer like incense. Lord, may we hasten without reluctance toward the goal of our journey, which is near. May we give ourselves completely to you before death comes like a thief to steal us away. May we offer you what is most precious to us, as the Father offered his only-begotten Son, as Mary offered Jesus, and all saints their works. Then when you call us, nothing will change. Death will be a splendid and almost imperceptible passage to the next life, in unity with you our God, who in your goodness became flesh and suffered the agony of the cross so that you could go before us, in death and in never-ending life.”

Chiara Lubich († 2008) was the founder and president of the Focolare movement. The Focolare movement began in the northern Italian city of Trent in 1943, in the climate of violence and hatred of the Second World War, the young elementary school teacher Chiara Lubich saw God's love as the only antidote when civil life was crumbling around her. With her Bible in hand while sheltering during air raids, she felt deeply Jesus' desire "that they all may be one." A group sharing her vision joined in helping those in the shelters and in the poorest parts of town, and numbers grew.

FAITH MATTERS:

While the Latin Mass Community observed the Kingship of our Lord Jesus Christ at the end of October, these reflections remain germane to our ongoing praying of the Lord’s Prayer, as we pray “Thy Kingdom come”. “Jesus of Nazareth is so intrinsically king that the title ‘King’ has actually become His name. By calling ourselves Christians, we label ourselves as followers of the king....God did not intend Israel to have a kingdom. The kingdom was a result of Israel’s rebellion against God. The law was to be Israel’s king, and, through the law, God Himself. God yielded to Israel’s obstinacy and so devised a new kind of kingship for them. The king is Jesus; in Him God entered humanity and espoused it to Himself. This is the usual form of the divine activity in relation to mankind. God does not have a fixed plan that He must carry out; on the contrary, He has many different ways of finding man and even of turning his wrong ways into right ways. The feast of Christ the King is therefore not a feast of those who are subjugated, but a feast of those who know that they are in the hands of the One who writes straight on crooked lines” (Pope Benedict XVI).
