MUSINGS & NOTES FROM THE ADMINISTRATOR'S DESK

One of the features of the Magnificat Mass Journal that I particularly enjoy and delight in reading is entitled "Saints Who" and for November, the series of 12 or so Saints (or Blesseds) are those "who teach about the Four Last Things". Quite often the series picks some of the lesser known saints and brings out surprising information that enriches one's appreciation of how the call to holiness worked in their lives, and how we imitate them as we seek their intercession. The first in every series gives the contours of what the later pages will explore, so I would like to quote the opening two paragraphs.

"Beginners in religion ought to exercise themselves principally in meditation on the Four Last Things" (Saint Philip Neri). The four last things—death, judgment, heaven hell—remote as they seem, are relevant to each moment of our life. We need to think about where we are headed. The destination of a journey determines the road, the maps, the companions, the supplies. Death is the moment for which we must prepare all our life. Saint Junípero Serra remarked that if one's death is good, nothing else matters. Why? Because after death comes our particular judgment, the decisive encounter with the Lord where our eternal fate is made known. Then, as Matthew's Gospel puts it, the evil will go off to eternal punishment, but the righteous to eternal life (25:46). The lives of those who kept these important things in sight can help us learn how to do the same.

Allow me to choose St. Dominic who sought to make a good death. "Born in 1180, Dominic Savio was the second of eleven children. Bright and friendly, he had a sincere devotion to God from an early age. At seven, he made his First Communion, along with four guiding resolutions: '1) I will go to Confession and Communion as often as my confessor will allow. 2) I will sanctify Sundays and holy days in a special way. 3) Jesus and Mary will be my friends. 4) Death but not sin.' In 1185, he met Saint John Bosco, whose Oratory he joined. Inspired by Bosco's conviction that it was easy to become a saint, he strove to do his ordinary duties in an extraordinary manner. He regularly participated in the "Exercise of a Happy Death," a monthly conference with confession, Mass, and special prayers. ~ *Continued on next page under FAITH MATTERS*

Dominic was permitted to know the time of his death and carefully prepared for the event. He said he wanted to do something for our Lady, but needed to do it quickly. With Bosco's guidance, he began the Sodality of the Immaculate Conception. He also requested and obtained a special plenary indulgence for the time of his death. Dominic died at fourteen on March 9, 1857. Years later he appeared to Bosco and told him: "What comforted me most at the point of death was the assistance of the powerful and loving Mother of God."

Kindest Father, inspired by Saint Dominic Savio, help us to prepare for death with eager simplicity and avail ourselves of the treasure of Mary's friendship."

Diagnosed with Parkinson's disease, Pope John Paul II continued to follow a vigorous public schedule, allowing the world to see him surrender his abilities one by one until his death on the eve of Divine Mercy Sunday, 2005. "Suffering can always become a source of good if it is experienced for love and with love through sharing, by God's gracious gift and one's own personal and free choice, in the suffering of Christ Crucified."
