Reflections from the Administrator's Desk

We observed the commemoration of the Faithful Departed last Tuesday on All Souls' Day, when we were invited to pray all of our deceased loved ones of our families and parishes, indeed of all who have died throughout the world. It has been edifying to witness the number of prayer cards being filled in by many who have included several names, whom I am sure did not just die last year but actually several years ago. While one of the seven Corporal works of mercy involves "burying the dead", there is a corresponding Spiritual work of mercy to pray for the dead. On this second week of November with the civil observance of Remembrance Day, it seems highly appropriate that we continue praying for the dead, especially for those who took an active role in combat defending our country in war and also serve in an auxiliary role during the wars and defense roles our country has been involved with. Even within a short time as a priest, I became aware of the suffering in what later came to be identified of post-traumatic stress disorder for those veterans who came back from the war and tried as best they could to pick up the pieces of their lives, often with much difficulty. In hearing of their stories and the struggles they had to deal with in alcoholism and broken or troubled marriages and family life, I developed a keen heart of compassion for what they had to cope with often with little or no support system to bolster them. The dead deserve and call for our remembrance in prayer and sacrifices so that we might assist and accompany them in their sojourn through purgatory. Here I might direct you to Par. 1030 - 1032 in the **Catechism of the Catholic Church** (1992). From the beginning the Church has honored the memory of the dead and offered prayers in suffrage for them, above all the Eucharistic sacrifice, so that, thus purified, they may attain the beatific vision of God. The Church also commends almsgiving, indulgences, and works of penance undertaken on behalf of the dead: "Let us help and commemorate them. If Job's sons were purified by their father's sacrifice, why would we doubt that our offerings for the dead bring them some consolation? Let us not hesitate to help those who have died and to offer our prayers for them." – St. John Chrysostom

May the souls of the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace. Amen.

FAITH MATTERS:

Prayer to Saint Joseph, patron of a happy death: Like his beloved virginal spouse, Saint Joseph can help us now and at the hour of our death. From St. Bernadine of Siena: “Christ does not now deny to Joseph that intimacy, reverence, and very high honor which he gave him on earth, as a son to his father. Rather we must say that in heaven Christ completes and perfects all that he gave at Nazareth. Now we can see how the last summoning words of the Lord appropriately apply to Saint Joseph: Enter into the joy of your Lord. In fact, although the joy of eternal happiness enters into the soul of a man, the Lord preferred to say to Joseph: Enter into joy. His intention was that the words should have a hidden spiritual meaning for us. They convey not only that this holy man possesses an inward joy, but also that it surrounds him, and engulfs him like an infinite abyss. Remember us, Saint Joseph, and plead for us to your foster-child. Ask your most holy bride, the Virgin Mary, to look kindly upon us, since she is the mother of him who with the Father and the Holy Spirit lives and reigns eternally. Amen.” ~*Magnificat*, November 2021, p. 7.
