Reflections from the Administrator's Desk

Three times we hear Jesus predicting His upcoming passion and death in similar words: "The Son of Man will be handed over to the chief priests and the scribes. They will condemn him to death and will hand Him over to the pagans, who will mock Him and spit at Him and scourge Him and put Him to death; and after three days He will rise again." Then Jesus would teach that those who wish to be His followers must renounce themselves and take up their cross and follow Him. Just as we find the apostles struggling with the impact of Jesus' words for their own lives before they would eventually understand and embrace this central characteristic of their discipleship of the Lord, so too many people both within the Church and society find it difficult to accept Jesus' teaching here about being willing to accept the mystery of the cross in their lives. Due to the growing secularism and the acceptance of "pseudo-science" guiding the manner in which large segments of society have chosen to live their lives, euthanasia or medical assistance in dying has become more acceptable in the minds of many since its legalization in June 2016. I say "pseudo-science" because this view constructs its own understanding of reality based on the removal of God as any moral authority and largely on personal convenience, rather than a more refined perception of the evidence of what exists and occurs naturally. Consequently, people see little meaning or purpose to suffering and any possible redemptive quality or connection to the passion of Christ, or have become so isolated and cut off from others that they are vulnerable to fears surrounding death. We need to affirm that our suffering is not without meaning, especially in terms of our eternal salvation in Christ. We need to remember Jesus' words about what we do in compassion to the least of our brothers and sisters, we do unto Him and then hear His invitation: "Enter into the kingdom prepared by my Father." There is so much more to living and dying with true dignity within the Christian Catholic perspective than meets the eye, and unfortunately this reflection will have to be continued next Sunday. Stay tune!! May God bless your faith and hope in Him.
