Reflections from the Administrator's Desk

Last Sunday I began these reflections on the importance of connecting our suffering to the passion of Christ, so that, as St. Paul points out, it might acquire redemptive value and merit in Christ, not only for us but also for others. Then Jesus reminds us of what we do for those who are suffering as having been done unto Him, then the aspect of helping and caring for those who are suffering in any way is never lost or for nothing. It could be the manner we come into the Kingdom of the Father, as Jesus tells us in St. Matthew's Gospel. With the promotion and wider acceptance of euthanasia might we not be depriving ourselves and others with the one significant way of entering into heaven, or worst yet, even excluding ourselves and others from eternal life with God?

When we reflect upon the horror that the world experienced collectively at the destruction and terrible suffering the Nazis inflicted upon the Jews and others killed in the Holocaust as World War II ended, this number estimated as high as 11 million pales by comparison to those lives killed through abortions and now through euthanasia. There is a real danger that the longer certain situations persist, that our moral sense is numbed and diminished as there comes to be an unfortunate tolerance of something that I might have personally disagreed with or objected to on moral grounds, but not enough that I would be prepared to work strongly for its elimination.

When we have virtually pushed God and faith principles from the public sector, and reduced religion as a private personal matter with no bearing how we exercise all the manners we engage with our society and world, then we have lost the major understanding that the Church is not just another non governmental organization that practices good in society like the United Way or Physicians Without Borders, etc. Rather the Church remains the voice of Christ, proclaiming the truth of God's Word to challenge and to correct the world and national governments when their policies run contrary to God's Word and the dignity of the human person as understood by the teachings found in the Bible and apostolic Tradition.
